INTRODUCING CCRTC'S NEWEST FACULTY MEMBER: MR. LENNART DE VISSER

The Board of Governors Covenant Canadian of Reformed Teachers College is delighted and thankful to announce the appointment of Mr. Lennart de Visser as a full-time faculty member, effective August 1, 2024.

Lennart was born in Pretoria, South Africa, Upon arriving in Hamilton, he attended Timothy Christian School and subsequently graduated from Guido de Brès Christian High School. He then completed an honours Bachelor of Arts degree in History and Philosophy at McMaster University. Lennart obtained his Bachelor of Education degree from Wilfrid Laurier University and accepted a teaching position at Providence Reformed Collegiate in Komoka, Ontario, where he currently serves as the Vice Principal. In this capacity he has been able to support beginning teachers in their induction into the teaching profession. He has also assisted in developing and implementing a model for instructional curriculum units and has shared this work with principals and teachers at conferences.

Eager to pursue graduate studies, Lennart completed a Master of Education degree at Dordt University in Sioux Center, Iowa. The capstone project involved high

school students, and consisted of action research through which elements of social emotional learning were explored using "Crew" as a model that promotes and captures a spirit of togetherness, belonging, and inclusion. Lennart's findings affirmed that this approach leads to fostering a school culture in which all students are valued contributors who

use their God-given gifts to the praise of his glory and to the service of each other.

Lennart de Visser is married to Hannah (née Verburg) and they are blessed with three boys: Levi, Micah, and Bennett. We wish the family a good transition, trusting they will be welcomed warmly as they settle in their new church, elementary school, and CCRTC community.

As we share our excitement with you, also recognize that one institution's gain is another institution's loss. We pray that God will bless the efforts of Providence Reformed Collegiate as it seeks to fill the vacancy that now exists due to this appointment.

THEME WEEK 2024: EARTH STEWARDSHIP MARK DEN HOLLANDER AND JACK HUIZENGA

Each year, our teacher candidates in the first and second year of CCRTC's Diploma of Teaching program participate in a week-long exploration of a thematic topic. Theme Week is intended to broaden and deepen the

personal knowledge of teacher candidates (and their instructors). Recent topics have included: This city of ours – Hamilton, The Holocaust, Foreign missions, and Touched by Disabilities. Planning for Theme Week 2024 began when weather and climate were often in the news, both in Canada and across the world. In 2023 there were a record number of wildfires across Canada. Smoke from these fires caused hazy skies as far south as New York City. In the

lack of rain creating concerns for farmers. In light of these recent events, it seemed fitting that *Earth Stewardship* would be the topic for Theme Week 2024.

What are we to make of all these natural events? Is there something to be said for climate change? How are we to respond as Reformed Christian school teachers? What can we do to equip our students to be discerning individuals and faithful stewards of God's creation? These are some of the questions we considered when planning for this week.

Theme Week started with a presentation by Dr. Peter Buist, professor emeritus from Carleton University in Ottawa. His presentation reminded us that God created a good world which was not only beautiful in the grand scheme, but also that beauty can be seen in the most intricate structures of creation and science. Yet this good creation groans because of sin and this can be seen in many different ways. The presentation shared some of the science regarding climate change through a Christian lens. This provided a helpful context for the other presentations that would take place during the week.

Two education-based organizations also shared their work with us. First was A Rocha (arocha.ca) which focuses on Christian environmental stewardship. One of their education coordinators shared with us the work their organization does in Ontario, Manitoba, and British Columbia. The other organization was EcoSchools which shared with us a robust program for integrating environmental learning in schools but from a secular perspective. One theme





that emerged from both presentations was the concept of ecoliteracy, a term that has come about due to students living most of their lives in a built environment. One way some schools have tackled ecoliteracy is through the development of natural playgrounds. Although that may not have been the motivation of some of our Reformed schools, several nearby schools have recently built natural playgrounds. The teacher candidates were divided into three groups to visit Grace Christian School, Timothy Christian School, and John Calvin Christian School to see their natural playgrounds and to learn about different projects and programs these schools had in place to promote environmental stewardship.

Two young, Reformed farmers also came to present to the teacher candidates. They have recently started an organic farm, The Good Ground Natural Farm in Beamsville, Ontario. They gave a biblical perspective on farming, sharing their vision for their own farm based on teachings found in scriptures and summarized in the Westminster Confession. Their presentation challenged us with how a biblical perspective on Earth stewardship might inform our agricultural practices.

To bring all these topics together, Dr. Van Dam, professor emeritus of the Canadian Reformed Theological Seminary, provided a beautiful devotional to illustrate Biblical principles for Earth stewardship, concluding that Christians must watch, work, and hope. After a brief wrap-up session and a pizza lunch, teacher candidates headed home, ready to take up their practicum placements the following week.
