CHAIRMAN'S REPORT FRANK C. LUDWIG

annual general meeting 2014 – a perspective

Once again the turning of February into March was the timing of another AGM – an annual event that appears to come more rapidly each year!

Some years ago we engaged in an exercise of visioning, which resulted in a visual image of a Greek temple with a base, a roof and five supporting pillars. As in the past, so this year, we work at developing and strengthening those five pillars which support our vision of the College as the definitive source for reformed teacher training.

Over the past year the PPC (Program and Personnel Committee) distributed a survey trying to get a read on the impressions and priorities "out there" regarding the Teachers College. Not surprisingly, it revealed that the major issue for the College was thought to be the achieving of accreditation. Indeed, an Ad Hoc Committee of the Board has been working on that very topic, progress on which was reported to this AGM.

Another important issue to come forward was the idea of succession, since a chart showing the likely retirement of the current full-time faculty will occur over three successive school years, before 2020 – which is a mere 6 years from now! Planning for that is in the works and has to proceed full-speed ahead.

Distance Education is also seen as a growing necessity, and some developments have occurred over recent months which have set that item on a fast-track, for the benefit of Western schools in particular.

Recruitment of students is a further item which has had our attention, and a plan of action on that was also presented to this AGM. Elsewhere in this issue our principal, Dr. vanHalen, will have elaborated on some of these points. I will limit myself to two items for the rest of this brief article – those being funding and leadership.

As we move forward in our planning, we always have to keep an eye on our budget and financial resources. Succession planning implies new hiring – with its related costs. Seeking accreditation is not only a very difficult undertaking, but also a very costly one. If we are to operate CCRTC responsibly we must pay attention to the financial resources available to us, which implies the ongoing, challenging task of fund-raising. To that end, we spent some time discussing how such fund-raising can be done, and the *persistent* effort that it requires on the part of the local governors. When they call please be ready to respond *positively*. Remember, they will not be asking for themselves, but for the on-going wellbeing of our schools and the education delivered there.

Regarding leadership, our Treasurer, despite his term being finished last year, stayed with us until now, but has submitted his resignation for June 30, 2014. The Vice-chairmanship has remained vacant for a period of two years now. With this AGM, the Secretary has also finished an 8-year association with the College, but fortunately she saw to her own replacement, which was endorsed at this meeting. We continue to look for new leadership in a younger demographic – it is time for younger men and women to step forward and carry this organization into the future. If you are approached – please think before you say no.....we need your gifts, your energy and your time. With your help, and under God's blessing, CCRTC will continue to prosper and fulfill its purpose "to supply our schools with teachers who are educated in reformed foundations".

TEACHING SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY



Let them praise the name of the LORD,

- for his name alone is exalted;
- his splendor is above the earth and the heavens.
- And he has raised up for his people a horn,
- the praise of all his faithful servants,
- of Israel, the people close to his heart.

Praise the LORD. -PS 148:13-14, NIV Ontario's Ministry of Education, for instance, holds that "scientific and technological literacy for all has become the overarching objective of science and technology education throughout the world." (S&T, 2007, p. 3) It elaborates on this with three overarching S&T goals:

- 1. Relate S&T to society and the environment;
- 2. Develop skills, strategies, and habits of mind required for scientific inquiry and technological problem solving;
- 3. Understand the basic concepts of S&T.

The curriculum guideline also provides suggestions for an effective and highquality S&T program. Consulting it is valid, because we honour our government, study the same creation, live in the same society, and use the same methodologies.

However, worldviews (which consider questions of origin, purpose, ethics, and the future), also affect S&T queries and outcomes. Provincial curricula habitually reflect a naturalist worldview in which chance and evolution are assumed, God and his providence are deliberately absent, and the goal is driven by earthly progress. Conversely, as (future) teachers help prepare students for their office as prophet, priest and king in this society (which may well include a career in S&T), they should boldly echo the call for all and everything to praise their Covenant Teachers College students learn that, for Science and Technology (S&T) programs, our schools typically consult provincial curriculum guidelines. These curricula often aim to develop some type of responsible, knowledgeable, skilled, caring and contributing citizen in possession of "S&T literacy."

Creator and Redeemer. (Ps 148) The antithetical element implied here does not preclude respectful discernment of possibly objectionable past or current other worldviews: In Lord's Days 32 and 33, gratitude has a humble tone that calls for a godly walk of life.

For CCRTC students, one crucial question is how to ensure a science lesson is reformed. Along with providing quality instruction and curiosity-stimulating content, they will praise their Creator, like Job did in 40:4-5 and 42:2-6, and others in Gen 1, and Ps 8, 19, 104, and 139. They will glory in God's wisdom and mighty works. (Prov 8) They will acknowledge with 1 Cor 1 and 8, Col 1, and Heb 12, that the same Christ through whom all things were created, and who is the mediator of the new covenant. the power of God and the wisdom of God, and our righteousness, holiness and redemption, is also supreme in all the cosmos and holds all things together. They will unceasingly encourage the coming generation to explore God's praiseworthy deeds with increasing wonder and understanding, to delight in the Creator, and to praise Him. A positive experience with S&T in elementary and secondary schools may well encourage some also to pursue a career in the sciences, and so address one of the weaknesses identified in the Cardus report.

When one walks through the hallways at the Teachers College, a number of displays catch the eye. One of them is a quilt that contains fifteen patches representing the graduating class of 2006. My patch is among those fifteen. Now, don't think it is easy to come up with something that represents you and also includes a statement about the impact the Teachers College has had on you. I was faced with a tough decision: what to put on that patch!

Before we go into that, let's go back and see how I ended up at the college in the first place. As an immigrant to Canada, I arrived at the age of 25 and got married to Janice Oosterhoff. Coming from a family of teachers - my father was a teacher, two brothers and one sister are teachers, each of them married a teacher as well - I had always in my mind that perhaps something different would be a good idea. When I settled here in Canada I ended up in a number of different sales positions. This was interesting, and it gave me great satisfaction to work with and help other people. But then something very significant happened: I became a father! After the Lord had blessed our marriage with a number of children we started to become more involved in the school society. As a Dutch immigrant, I had always taken reformed education somewhat for granted because the system in the Netherlands completely integrates faithbased education, and going to a reformed



school was perfectly normal. Once I got involved in the system that we have here in Ontario I realized the tremendous effort and sacrifice it takes to make it all work. I also came to see the significance of reformed education, and the important role it plays in the development of children of the covenant. The Lord stirred in me a desire to become a teacher in this system, and in 2005 I enrolled in the one year program at the Teachers College. So, there I was. 36 years old in a school where the average student is in the early twenties, a family to support, and standing at the beginning of a complete career change. What was I doing?! But the experience was good. We learned how to think about education from a reformed perspective, to plan curriculum, to develop Bible lessons, and our practicums gave us classroom experience. And if I reflect on the impact the Teachers College has had on my life, I would have to say that the opportunity that it has provided is for me the biggest thing. After graduation I became a grade 5/6 teacher in Chatham, ON, and after four years we moved to Guelph where I took up my current position as principal and grade 7 and 8 teacher at Cornerstone Christian School. I love my job, and thank the Lord daily for allowing me to serve Him in this special way.

Now back to that patch in that quilt in the hallway in the Teachers College. I sometimes felt that in taking the step to go back to school was somewhat similar to Julius Caesar making the decision to cross the Rubicon. Maybe not as dramatic but nonetheless a big step; once the decision was made, there was no turning back. Julius is often remembered by his famous idiom: Veni Vidi Vici; I came, I saw, I conquered. Should I put that on the patch? I certainly

felt good about obtaining the Diploma of Education and what the college had done to prepare me for my task as a teacher, but I did not feel like a conqueror. I felt more of a sense of appreciation. And so I decided at that time that my patch would say: Veni, Vidi, Accipio – I came, I saw, I appreciated. Looking back on it now, I still feel the same way. Our Teachers College is a very important spoke in the wheel that makes our reformed schools roll. We can thank the Lord for the great gift we receive in our own Teachers College as it trains and prepares new teachers to help in the task of raising our covenant children in the name of the Lord. Thank you, CCRTC, for all that vou do!

I attended Covenant Canadian Reformed Teachers' College from 2002-2004. The Lord has blessed us richly by providing us with the means to operate the College.

To this point in the year we are meeting the budget and are able to meet our expenses. We do have a challenge ahead of us in that we have about 62% of the required annual revenue as of the end of February. While this sounds good, and it is, we are usually ahead of this value by this time. December is usually a bigger donation month than we experienced. Perhaps the ice storm and the cold weather in southern Ontario distracted us
