Finance Report

he Lord willing, Covenant Canadian Reformed Teachers College will celebrate its twenty-fifth anniversary. Over the past 25 years, the college has had 23 graduation ceremonies with 161 successful graduates. Most of these young men and women have found employment as Reformed teachers in many elementary and secondary schools on the North American continent, as well as in South America, Australia, and Europe. In short, the college has been instrumental in aiding the continuation of Reformed education in various localities.

The college has seen many changes over the years and much growth. This growth is manifested, not only in the number of students, but also in areas such as curriculum development, additional programs, and professional development. It is always a challenge to find faculty for the college who are able to offer programs that adequately cover all that is necessary for the training of Reformed teachers.

It is no less a challenge, however, to meet the financial needs of this active and vital college. The membership of the college is made up of school societies that are assessed a nominal fee in accordance with the number of students in those schools. The bulk of the income, however, must come from tuition and donations. Tuition fees have been rising steadily over the past several years, as have the recommended donation rates. This is done to offset the increasing financial needs of the college. All of the relevant budgetary information is included for your perusal. You will note that the recommended donation for the year 2006-2007 has again been set at \$375.00 per donor. Of course, donations of any amount are most welcome! Please send your donation to your local representative or directly to the college using the enclosed self-addressed, postage-paid envelope. It will help our comptroller greatly if you provide the information requested on the form below.

At this time, Covenant College finds itself once again on the edge of a financial shortfall. We are appealing to all our faithful supporters for donations. At present, we need \$100,000.00 by the end of August to meet our budgeted needs. If you have not yet contributed for the year 2005-2006, please do not delay any longer. We need your support today. ith the blessing of the Lord, the work at the college, both in front of and behind the scenes, continues. With so many students our staff enjoyed a busy and rewarding year. for its annual meeting. At this meeting I officially became the new chairman. The annual meeting is enjoyed by all as a way to become reacquainted but it is also a weekend where much work takes place.

In preparation for the annual meeting, the board had put together the framework for a new board structure that would alter its manner of functioning. At the meeting this new structure was adopted. The most significant changes include bimonthly board meetings instead of monthly and the introduction of two new executive positions: vice-treasurer and past-chairman. The new structure will put renewed emphasis on committees doing their work, particularly in the months between board meetings. It has always been the position of the board that its primary function is to provide vision and leadership to the college.

Committees are now given the power to do their work, reporting to the board and seeking its advice when required. The biggest

challenge the board faces with the new emphasis on committees is the fact that we have such wide representation geographically. The board recognizes this and we are making efforts to make committee work easier by having committees made up of individuals who are in the same geographical area. For example, three "locals" are to be established to address fund raising: Ontario, Manitoba, and BC/USA. The board and committee calendars also require adjustments to reflect the new working model. Most importantly, the board recognizes the hours and traveling its many committee members put in and it is hoped that this new way of doing business will streamline the efforts of all involved.

I am often asked what developments have taken place with respect to accreditation. All I can report at the moment is that the work continues but there are significant hurdles to overcome. As board chair, I am now a part of the Accreditation Committee and I have seen first hand the challenges the committee faces. Nevertheless, we remain strongly committed to seeking accreditation.

I would be remiss if I concluded without acknowledging the work of our past chairman, Mrs. Martha de Gelder. Martha has long been a driving force behind the scenes at the college and her vision and commitment have been unwavering. In her new role of past-chairman I, for one, will continue to enjoy her insight and wisdom. Her mentoring and guidance have been welcomed. Martha has been involved with Covenant College for many years and we, as board, wish her every blessing in her retirement. We also welcome her continuing work and leadership as past-chair.

I conclude by thanking our Heavenly Father for all that he has provided: staff, students, a wonderful facility, widespread representation from across Canada and the USA, financial resources, and many hours of labour from dedicated volunteers and support staff.

The Commencement evening on May 26 marked a festive end to the 2005-2006 academic year. Fifteen graduates, our largest


graduating class ever, received their diplomas before a large crowd of family, friends, and supporters of Covenant College.

tremendous blessing! By teaching the various subjects you give

the children wings, allowing them to soar like an eagle – observing

the beauty of God's creation, enabling them to read the Scriptures









You have come to see that the foundation of Reformed education is the doctrine of the covenant. The children you will teach are special. They share with you a mark that distinguishes them from others - they bear the mark of God's redeeming love and faithfulness! Moreover, as brand new teachers you will begin to teach within the context of the age-old struggle of the antithesis. Together with your future students you are on the battlefield fighting three sworn enemies - the devil, the world and your own sinful flesh. In that battle you are to help the students hold high the banner that acknowledges Christ to be King of every area of life!

Integral to covenant education is character education. Character education is concerned with the way you talk, the behaviour you model, the conduct you tolerate, the deeds you encourage, the expectations you transmit. 2 Peter 1 reminds us that good character and virtue is basic to the Christian life - and thus also to Reformed education. What takes place in the school constitutes a microcosm of what we should expect within the church in general. Peter writes, "For this reason, make every effort to add to your faith virtue, to virtue knowledge... For if you possess these qualities in

increasing measure, they will keep you from being ineffective and unproductive in your knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ."

Effective character education is not adding a program or set of programs to a school. Rather it is to be integrated into every aspect of school life, including discipline, playground duty and sports. Everything in the school is organized around the development of relationships between and among students, staff, and community.

The wonderful thing about life in the covenant is that all we are called to do has its basis and foundation in what has been done for us. When Peter calls us to excellence of character he prefaces what he says by, "for this very reason." He has spoken of God's divine power to give us all things. We labour for excellence of character because God has already laboured for us and is at work in us.

Graduates, may what you have learned at Covenant College lead to an ever greater appreciation for God's work with His people. May you all look forward to the final commencement ceremonies that will take place when your Teacher, Jesus Christ, will return, and when those character traits which have stood the test of time will enable us live in a perfect community of covenant love.
