The Spring of 2021 marked a significant milestone in the history of Covenant **Canadian Reformed Teachers College (CCRTC):**

The Minister of Colleges and Universities granted approval, subject conditions, to confer a Bachelor of Education degree to students who

successfully complete the two-year program. This ministerial consent opens the way for the College to pursue the required professional accreditation by the Ontario College of Teachers (OCT). The process has now been put in motion and several cordial meetings between OCT's accreditation branch and CCRTC's faculty have already taken place. Once again we find ourselves

articulating our raison d'être, along with the principles that shape CCRTC's operation, this time in the context of the Ontario Regulations that govern the teaching profession. Lord willing, the application will be submitted in the late Fall of this year and a review panel will be appointed at that time. As always, we covet your prayers.


