For all the promises of God find their Yes in Him. That is why it is through him that we utter our Amen to God for his glory. And it is God who establishes us with you in Christ, and has anointed us, and who has also put his seal on us and given us his Spirit in our hearts as a guarantee.

2 Corinthians 1: 20-22

On May 22, the processional of graduands from Covenant Canadian Reformed Teachers College (CCRTC) was led down the aisle of Cornerstone Canadian Reformed Church by Dr. van Halen-Faber. The Chairman, Mr. Bill Buist, opened the evening with the reading of 2 Corinthians 1: 12 -22 and prayer. He welcomed everyone, especially the graduands. The Chairman then introduced the keynote speaker, Rev. Wynia. His speech was entitled, "Through Him, we utter our Amen to God for His glory." All of the promises of God find their "yes" in Jesus Christ. God always answers "yes" to those who put their faith and trust in Him. Our whole life is the "amen"; this is the testimony of believers. God has made promises to you personally in your baptism. He underlined the promises in the Lord's supper. You have experienced the saving power of the gospel. God says "yes". We say "amen". By faith, we have certainty. The Spirit dwells in our hearts as a guarantee. Rev. Wynia reminded the graduands that as teachers, they are called to teach the children whom God has entrusted to them. The children have been given the same promises of salvation in which they believe. As teachers, they should want to worship God with these children. As they set out to fulfill this calling, they are encouraged to hold this goal before them, to love these children whom God has entrusted to them. Rev. Wynia concluded with saying that we pray that the students will follow their example and that they will see God's promises to those children finding their "yes" in Jesus Christ. And that they will utter their "amen" together with them for His glory.

After the main address, Dr. van Halen-Faber addressed the graduands. She expressed thankfulness for a school year filled with regular activity at the College. She gave a special thanks to the Harvest Foundation. For the first time this year, students could apply for bursary or tuition assistance. She was also thankful for the largest incoming class in the history of the College coming this September and for Mr. Lennart de Visser who has accepted a full-time faculty position. While Mr. Wieske was unable to attend the evening, Dr. van Halen-Faber read a poem that he had written to the graduands.

Dr. van Halen-Faber declared that the five graduands; Chantal Lof, Hannah Bartels (who entered the college as Hannah Kelly), Kylie Bylsma (who entered the college as Kylie Enter), Makayla Kruisselbrink, and Natalie VanLuik, are cleared to graduate and asked the Chairman and Mr. Mark den Hollander to come forward. Mr. den Hollander introduced each of the graduands prior to receiving their diploma. Receiving the Diploma of Education was Chantal Lof. Hannah Bartels, Kylie Bylsma, Makayla Kruisselbrink, and Natalie VanLuik received the Diploma of Teaching. A gift was presented to the graduates, -a book entitled, "God's Timeline: The Big Book of Church History".

Hannah Bartels and Makayla Kruisselbrink gave the Valedictory Address in which they summed up the characters of each graduate. They talked about how they have been a close-knit group. They shared laughter and were known to get off-topic in class at times. They expressed thankfulness to each full-time and part-time faculty member and especially to our covenant Father for all His blessings. Each of the graduates had been blessed with the love of music, and they were often found together in the music













room. Chantal and Natalie played the violin, Makayla played the piano, Hannah and Kylie loved to sing. A special song to them is "I am not my own" by Keith and Kristyn Getty. The rest of the class joined Hannah and Makayla, and they performed this song together. The class then presented the staff with a gift. Dr. van Halen-Faber had often remarked that this was one of the most musical classes that she ever had. The gift was fitting; it was a sign with the words of Psalm 105: 1,2, which the graduates hoped would be hung in the music room.

The program concluded with a presentation on behalf of W.A.T.C.H. by Beth Stel, who

presented a cheque for \$10,000. Dr. van Halen-Faber expressed her thankfulness for the gift. It will be put to good use to put the finishing touches in the student lounge.

Mr. Rob Enter, the father of Kylie Bylsma, closed the evening with a prayer of thanksgiving to our heavenly Father.

informal Although an Women's Savings Action group was more or less active since the opening of the College, the current group, "Women Assisting the Teachers College Hamilton", known as "W.A.T.C.H.", was formally instituted in the summer of 1997. Its aim was "to involve the sisters of the Canadian Reformed church and school communities in a variety of efforts to raise additional funds for the purpose of purchasing items not normally included in the regular operating budget of the Teachers College" and this goal has remained unchanged for the last 27 years of our group's operation.

At the inception of W.A.T.C.H. in 1997, 57 letters were sent out in search of a representative in each congregation, including churches in the USA and Australia. Although the initial response of only 12 letters in reply was somewhat disappointing, there were 10 ladies who stepped forward to act as representatives in that first year. By 2001, just four years later, we had over 25 ladies from the three countries on board, who together raised \$2400 that year.

Twenty-seven years later, although we no longer have the involvement of Australian representatives, we are still represented by 36 ladies in Canada, and one in the USA. Of their respective congregations, about half fundraise faithfully every year, with others donating on a more sporadic basis. We are thankful to report that even through challenging years such as we saw in 2020, donations have remained fairly steady, and therefore we are blessed to present to the College tonight, a cheque for \$10,000, as we pray for the Lord's continued blessing on the College and the supporting efforts of W.A.T.C.H.
