On Friday, May 25, 2018, family and friends of the five graduating students of Covenant Canadian Reformed Teachers College and supporters of CCRTC gathered together to celebrate the annual graduation ceremony held at Cornerstone Canadian Reformed Church in Hamilton.

The chairman of the Board of Governors, Mr. Richard Feenstra, opened the evening with words of welcome, Scripture reading, and prayer. He also spoke a few words concerning the role of teacher as gardener, nurturing the students in their classroom as young trees to grow and bear fruit pleasing to the LORD, helping them to establish roots. Thinning, watering, and pruning are all essential to ensure a rich harvest.

Mr. Feenstra then introduced the speaker for the evening, Mr. Jason Heemskerk, who is currently the coordinator for the League of Canadian Reformed School Societies. His address was entitled, "And we have scamps ...! Good teaching is the art of loving the monsters under your wings...to the end that they may serve their God." To focus on who we are as people, Mr. Heemskerk used two definitions of "monster" as given by Merriam-Webster

as "one who deviates from the normal or accepted behaviour" and "a powerful person or thing that cannot be controlled and that causes many problems." He connected these definitions to the confession of Article 14 of the Belgic Confession, "man became wicked and perverse, corrupt in all his ways."

A classroom is a room full of sinners, as emphasized in Romans 7:19, "For what I do is not the good I want to do; no, the evil I do not want to do - this I keep on doing." Teachers need to remember that students are broken people who are doing what they can to use the gifts that they have been given. Teachers must be careful not to make children fit a preconceived mold at the expense of erasing character. A teacher has the choice to prune a character until it is the image of perfection or to use the natural shape of the character and hone it so that the student may learn to use his/her talents appropriately. Students need to see that the teacher knows who they are, accepts who they are, and that while a teacher will prune and shape them, the teacher will not stunt them nor make them into something they are not. The teacher will image the way God loves each one of His broken people, to show the students the love of Christ and show them what it means to belong to their Saviour in safety.

In her principal's address, Dr. Christine van Halen emphasized that Christian education at all levels is a treasure, to be appreciated and safeguarded but also to be acted upon and used. She took some time to speak to the graduands about their new role as treasurekeepers. She challenged them "to safeguard the treasure called Reformed education, to actively work with it, to explore it, to deepen your understanding of it and to truly make it your own." She also highlighted two firsts of this graduating class: Robin Vanderwoude is the first graduate of the two-year program and Rhonda Kelly is the first to complete the three-year program while also being a wife and mother.

At this point, the registrar, principal, and chairman conferred the diplomas on the graduands. The Diploma of Education was granted to Robin Vanderwoude and the Diploma of Teaching to Brandi Boersema, Erica DeBoer, Christina Feenstra, and Rhonda Kelly. With thankfulness, it could be noted that each has been appointed to a teaching position. Brandi Boersema and Rhonda Kelly then gave their valedictory address, giving the audience a little glimpse into their school years.

W.A.T.C.H. made their annual presentation, presenting a cheque for \$8000 and heartfelt thanks was extended to all contributors. Several faculty milestones were remembered; see Marking and Celebrating Milestones for details. As the evening concluded, we could be thankful for another year of instruction at Covenant Canadian Reformed Teachers College and another year in which its work could serve some part of making known among the nations what God has done!

Having obtained his teaching credentials from the Albertus Zijlstra Pedagogische Academie in Groningen, The Netherlands, Allard started his teaching career in Hardewijk. It did not take long before he and his wife Joanne made the courageous decision to immigrate to Canada where Allard joined the staff at John Calvin School in Smithville. Over the years, their journey continued: From Smithville to Fergus, to Langley, to Winnipeg, and eventually to Hamilton where Allard joined the full-time faculty in 2004. Indeed, at the occasion of retiring from active teaching, Allard can look back on a rich career experience in which he touched hundreds of students at the elementary and secondary school levels, and lastly in the teacher education setting. During the past 14 years, Allard taught a variety of courses ranging from the practical applications in teaching studies, to educational psychology, ethics, and social studies. In addition to his teaching, Allard served the college as the practicum coordinator. As our ways part, we express our appreciation for the many contributions Allard made to CCRTC, its students, and its faculty. We pray that the LORD will continue to give Allard and Joanne good health and strength to enjoy many years together in retirement - putting their hope and trust in God, praising and serving him in whatever place he has ordained for them.
